Julian Assange: A Short Biography

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In 2013, Skyhorse Publishing published a book in New York. The author was Andrew Fowler. The Title of the book was, <u>The Most Dangerous Man in the World</u>. The following short biography of Julian Assange draws most heavily upon Andrew Fowler's book about Julian Assange. He has done a magnificent job of helping us to know the real Julian Assange.

Julian Assange

Who is this most extraordinary individual, Julian Assange? Who is this man who threatens the corrupted parts of the world's political and military establishment?

AN ANARCHIST: In 2013 Julian Assange was described by the United States State Department as an "Anarchist". The author of the book, <u>The Most Dangerous Man</u> <u>in the World</u>, Andrew Fowler, says on page 231 that, "*His world view was shaped by the Australia of the 1970s and 80s, especially its hacker community*".

BIRTH: Julian Assange was born in 1971 to Christine Assange at a hospital in Townsville, Australia. The father, John Shipton, was nowhere to be seen. Christine made her way back to Magnetic Island with her newborn child. Life on Magnetic Island is interesting. It is said that, "it's still a matter of heated debate there whether or not Christine Assange shot a taipan snake as it nestled on Julian's bed". She once left a note in the visitor's book of the local cultural centre and museum in her firm, elegant hand. It read: I live "in a bikini" and am "going native with my baby and other mums on the island". Christine is described as very strong-willed and very defiant. Once, she "burned her school books—which, considering she was the daughter of a college principal, was clearly designed to have maximum impact". When she was 17 she ran away from home having bought a tent and a motorcycle with money she had made from selling her paintings. Christine brought up Julian with her view that "formal education could instill an unhealthy respect for authority. Julian seemed to thrive. For a boy his age he showed an extraordinary interest in mathematics and even philosophy remarkable for an eight-year-old. He devoured dozens of books on the subjects...Julian enjoyed the country. He said, 'I was living like a Tom Sawyer'". He built a raft, "had other boys steal it and reclaim it". Julian had a horse of his own, and said that "I have no complaints at all about this part of my childhood". {DMW p. 1-4}

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BREAKING NEWS: May 19, 2017—coming on the heels of the release of Bradley Manning, it was announced today that Sweden's charges against Assange have been dropped. These are the charges brought against Assange for rape. Two women with whom Assange was having an affair, who found out about each other, had brought these charges against him. Assange always maintained that his relationship with both women was consensual.

We are told that Manning was released because of a pardon from Obama. From what is known of that president, Manning's pardon would indicate that a deal might have been made with Manning for Manning to infiltrate the Assange camp. Understand that Manning was being tortured. Whether Manning broke or not, Assange cannot allow himself to trust Manning. This is surely a disappointment for Assange, who offered to trade himself for Manning in order to stop Manning's torture. Assange will be glad that Manning is free.

The timing of Manning's release and the rape charges against Assange being dropped in Sweden is interesting. We are told that Assange currently resides at the Ecuadorian Embassy in Britain. 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BRADLEY MANNING: Bradley Manning was a US military intelligence officer stationed in Iraq. Supposedly, Manning made a huge classified document drop that *"WikiLeaks had received"*. {DMW p. 126}

"Bradley Manning and Julian Assange are just two in a long line who are under investigation. An FBI linguist has already been jailed for twenty months for leaking information to a blogger, and an employee of the National Security Agency (NSA) has been charged for allegedly handing over classified information to the Baltimore Sun about an intelligence project which even the NSA admitted in the end had wasted a billion dollars of taxpayers' money on a failed contract." {DMW p. 227}

BRITAIN: Julian Assange "posted the Ministry of Defense's Manual for Security on the WikiLeaks site. It put journalists in the same category as foreign intelligence services criminals, terrorist groups and disaffected staff when it came to posing threats to the security of the country". Assange gave "Britain's counterintelligence organization MI5 a diplomatic headache by upsetting Britain's oldest ally, the United States, and exposing deception in its prosecution of war. He's revealed the grim truth about America's invasion of Iraq, exposing potential war crimes, the torturing of Iraqi prisoners and revealing the true number of civilian casualties Washington had so carefully kept from the public". {DMW p. ix}

CYBERPUNKS: "From his home in suburban Melbourne, Julian Assange linked up with kindred spirits around the world. They called themselves Cyperpunks, a pun on the word cipher, the art of encryption and punk...the Cyperpunks were an elite club of hackers, mathematicians, nonconformists and activists. Their manifesto firmly wedded them to the notion that an individual's right to 'privacy is necessary for an open society in the electronic age'. They believed they could not 'expect governments, corporations, or other large, faceless organizations to grant us privacy'." {DMW p. 24}

About the time that Cypherpunks was taking on Scientology, "Cypherpunks started building up an armoury. Assange began creating free software to make the now emerging Internet more accessible for all, and developed systems to wage cyber warfare against his enemies. Just a few months earlier he had created an extraordinary device capable of scanning hundreds of thousands of computers at any one time to find their weaknesses. It was called a Strobe port scanner...All the most sophisticated defenses of governments and big companies were vulnerable to one weak entry point...It was like a huge mansion equipped with the most sophisticated [and very expensive] security—everything double-locked and barred—but the bathroom window left open. Strobe could also be used by a company to test its own defenses against its vulnerability to attack, but no one took that as a serious reason for its creation". {DMW p. 28}

Julian Assange told Cypherpunks that, "'oppressive governments' had controlled the possession of everything, from short-wave receivers to computer printers". In Iraq typewriters had to be registered and the owner had to give the government a mechanical fingerprint of the machine in the form of an example of how the machine printed. "It wasn't difficult to imagine that governments would try to register and regulate the possession of modems, the electronic gateway that connected early computers to the emerging Internet." China strictly controls everything its population hears or sees. The term "human rights" does not exist in China. "But there were other systems of control that China wasn't alone in using. Both the United States and Australia banned reception from satellites on 'non-governmental approved frequencies'. {DMW p. 28}

"The West could not defend...against Scientology or China." {DMW p. 81}

CRYPTOME: John Young, who is said to have an "anarchic spirit", created Cryptome. Julian Assange had been closely interested in Cryptome. "*The Whistleblowing website perfectly fitted his campaign for more open government, accountability and the protection of free speech around the world*." Within its first three years, the Cryptome site was receiving hundreds of hits a day and had accumulated thousands of documents. "*The juicer postings included a list of people who were working for the British overseas intelligence agency MI6…Perhaps not surprisingly, Cryptome was also attracting the interest of the NSA. Every day at 7:00 a.m., the spy agency would drop in on the site using an automatic information gatherer called a robot, download two copies of the latest files, and then leave.*" The NSA actually stole documents. {DMW p. 36-37}

EGO MANIACS (THE PRESS): Julian Assange went to the Press before the massive WikiLeaks release. As one witness put it, the press was, "Shitting on the goose that had laid the golden egg". The egos of the New York Times, The Guardian and Der Spiegel only allowed them to see themselves as superior to their WikiLeaks source, Julian Assange, not collaborators or partners. The New York Times, The Guardian and Der Spiegel ran for cover when threatened with the 1917 Espionage Act, yet seeking "journalistic prestige", all quite disgusting to Julian Assange. {DMW p. 159, 161, 189 and 199}

"He [Assange] must have been growing tired of his treatment by the Guardian a newspaper he admired and believed was socially progressive. One witness to a discussion between Assange and senior Guardian staff including its editor and deputy editor said they [Guardian staff] were conceited and dismissive. This witness was surprised by their treatment of Assange." {DMW p. 199}

FREEDOM OF SPEECH: Julian Assange is a strong believer in the First Amendment of the US Constitution: Freedom of Speech. As he put it, "We are, if you like, enforcing the First Amendment around the world". Assange wanted to "build a more open relationship with the public where they too, not just the journalists, could see raw data and make their own decisions." {DMW p. xiii and xiv}

HOME-SCHOOLED: Julian Assange attended over 100 schools. He was homeschooled for 18 months by specialist teachers. He taught himself machine code and was "drawn to the subterranean culture spawned by the dawn of the computer age". Andrew Fowler said that, "Assange had a searing intellect that set him apart from most children...children who rose above IQ 170 were liable to regard school with indifference or with positive dislike". Julian's IQ was over 170. His mother, Christine, said that he had a "high level of genius". Assange was easily bored in public school. During the time when he was home-schooled, his academic life took off. By the time that he returned to public school, Julian had taught himself computer-programming language (machine code). During high school days "Assange's bookishness earned him the title 'Prof'". Julian wrote about himself and a teenage friend: "We were bright sensitive kids who didn't fit into the dominant subculture and fiercely castigated those who did as irredeemable boneheads". {DMW p. 10-11}

INTERNATIONAL HACKER: The life of someone as extraordinary as Julian Assange is not an easy one. Julian had to try to balance his life as a father and as an international hacker. "By 1991 his world was coming apart. His wife walked out on him, taking their son with her." The break-up was filled with bitterness and anger and was not easy for Assange. According to Andrew Fowler, it devastated Assange and he fell into a deep depression. He even stopped using his beloved computer and became careless about what he left laying around. "On 29 October 1991 there was a loud knock at the door. It was AFP's [Australia's Federal Police?] Ken Day, flanked by several police officers." He had been "wrestling with the classic dichotomy of a hacker's personality. He needed to be anonymous, to 'fly below the radar'...at the same time Assange sought recognition within the hacking community of 'being the best' ". Enough evidence was uncovered to put Assange away for 10 years and Assange continued to live life on the edge. "Among fellow hackers, his tangle with the authorities had turned him into a minor star...he'd managed to position himself at the forefront of the struggle over the direction of the Internet...Assange stood for an open and free system, where collective action and community benefit always came before cash." {DMW p. 21-23}

IRAQ WAR: What kinds of information were leaked to the public through WikiLeaks? One thing was an embassy cable that said, "the British government had promised to protect the United States from probing questions during its investigation into the Iraq War". {DMW p. 192} Questions were raised about who was protecting whom?

KENYON POLICE KILLINGS: Because Kenyon whistleblowers were the target of the police in Kenya; Julian Assange leaked a massive amount of information in order to make the scandal known to the public. In Kenya, whistleblowers were dealt with swiftly and permanently. The whistleblowers became "canaries in a coal mine". {DMW p. 86}

MANNING, BRADLEY: Bradley Manning decided to trust a man by the name of Adrian Lamo, a Carmichael, California 'sometimes journalist', habitual drug user and convicted criminal; but also an Internet hero with 'interesting relationships with members of US military intelligence'. In late May 2010 Lamo, "received a message from Private First Class Bradley Manning, an intelligence officer...based in East Baghdad. Manning had access to two computers connected to SIPRNET: the Secret Internet Protocol Router Network and the Joint Worldwide Intelligence Communications Systems (JWICS) systems of interconnected computer networks used by US Defense Department and State Department", plus half a million others. Manning was 22 at the time. He had been bullied. On his Facebook he wrote, "Bradley Manning is not a piece of equipment". He also joked about 'military intelligence' being an oxymoron. In early May of 2010 Manning changed his Facebook status to: "Bradley Manning is now left with the sinking feeling that he doesn't have anything left". A few days later, on May 21, 2010, Manning contacted Internet sensation and journalist, Adrian Lamo. This is what Manning wrote to Lamo: "Hi how are you. I'm an army intelligence analyst, deployed to eastern Baghdad, pending discharge for 'adjustment disorder'. I'm sure you're pretty busy. If you had unprecedented access to classified networks 14 hours a day 7 days a week for 8+ months, what would you do?"

"Within hours Lamo had called his friends in military intelligence and met up with the FBI...turning Manning in." Meanwhile, "Manning believed that in Lamo he had a trusted journalist who could offer him protection. Later on, respected Salon.com journalist Glen Greenwald asked Lamo-- GREENWALD: 'So early on in the conversation you had discussions with him [Manning] about the fact that because you were a journalist you could offer him protection, confidentiality protection, as a source...you talked about that with him? LAMO: This is correct...'" Adrian Lamo, a journalist, betrayed Manning.

"The Following day, 26 May, Bradley Manning was arrested by military police at Forward Base Hammer...Blithely unaware of the unfolding [world class] drama, Assange carried on business as usual in Melbourne, preparing for a huge drop of US documents, a total of 91 000 reports on war in Afghanistan...Though the world thought that WikiLeaks was staffed by hundreds of people, the fact is that WikiLeaks had no more than ten people who were engaged fulltime...Assange was to all interests and purposes WikiLeaks."

Andrew Fowler included the following incident in his book about Assange: "Just as we were beginning to edit our Foreign Correspondent report ready for broadcasting Assange put in an unexpected call to the story producer. He was in a bind; something had happened. Assange had been going to go to the United States and now he couldn't. Manning was languishing in a Kuwait military prison, waiting to be sent to the US...Exactly when Assange knew isn't clear, but by 2 June—four days before the news broke publically—he was connected enough to ban any thought of traveling to the United States to meet Daniel Ellsberg for the first time. He arranged instead to video Skype in to a conference in Manhattan where Ellsberg would be on stage at what was called a 'Personal Democracy Forum'". That was 2010. As of this writing it is 2017. Currently, and for some time, Julian Assange has been living in the Ecuadorian Embassy in Britain. If he tried to leave that embassy the British government would have him arrested (detained for questioning), with intentions of an eventual execution in Britain, or in the US. It would be difficult to determine who hates Assange more, Hillary Clinton or British Royalty (World Order). At the gathering, Ellsberg said that he was, "sure it was a 'high priority' for the US government to 'neutralize him [Assange] one way or another and I wouldn't exclude physical danger'. Ellsberg added that 'trying to find ways to discredit him or keep him from communicating with possible sources, is a very high priority' for the US Government".

MANNING AND WIKILEAKS: Julian Assange started an organization called WikiLeaks. He is the Editor-in-Chief.

Julian Assange "marshaled hundreds of people around the world to work for WikiLeaks for free—supporting the organization and its banks of secret computer servers that hosted some of the most sensitive, highly classified information in the world. And he's done it very quickly...it had been a long time in the making...But...in just four years, WikiLeaks had produced an impressive strike record." WikiLeaks releases were revolutionary. {DMW p. xii}

> CABLEGATE—Before WikiLeaks stunned the world with the truth about what was happening in Afghanistan (hundreds of civilians were being killed by American troops in undisclosed incidents), WikiLeaks made Washington an offer, but "the White House failed to take up the offer given to them by WikiLeaks. The offer was to talk/vet any of the documents before they were released by WikiLeaks". {DMW p. 154} WikiLeaks "stunned the world with its sensational exposés of leaked material culminating in 'Cablegate'—thousands of classified diplomatic dispatches from US embassies around the world that gave an extraordinary insight into American foreign policy: from spying on the UN to how Arab nations wanted Washington to bomb Iran. It was the biggest single leak in history. In the furore [mad rage] that followed there were calls for Assange to be hunted down and even assassinated; in the United States, [then] Vice President Joe Biden had called him [Assange] a 'high-tech terrorist'. Adding to the clamor, Assange was wanted in Sweden to answer allegations of 'suspected rape and sexual molestation' by two women-resulting in an Interpol arrest warrant for him to be extradited to answer the accusations". {DMW p. vii - viii} Many believe that these two women somehow became aware that each was having sexual relations with the same man and became enraged at that man. Others think that the women are being paid by certain governments to stop Assange by any means possible. Still others say that they have seen media proof that Hillary Clinton wanted to bomb an embassy where Assange was supposedly staying in order to eradicate him.

> COLLATERAL MURDER—"The way WikiLeaks arrived on the world stage in early 2010 proved it was no ordinary media organization. It posted a leaked video of a military helecopter killing unarmed civilians in a Baghdad street and provocatively called it 'Collateral Murder'. Assange wanted to build a more open relationship with the public where they too, not just the journalists, could see the raw data and make their own decisions." {DMW p. xiv}

CYBERSPACE WHISTLEBLOWING AND THE STATE—"The problem in Assange's view, was the veil of secrecy surrounding government: 'The citizenry have a right to scrutinize the state.' ...WikiLeaks fought to define itself in the uncharted waters of whistelblowing in cyberspace and journalism." {DMW p. xiii}

DANIEL ELLSBERG—"WikiLeaks had attracted serious attention and admiration, in particular from one of the world's most celebrated whistleblowers, Daniel Ellsberg; whose dump of classified material in the early 1970's, known as the Pentagon Papers, revealed how repeated US administrations had lied about their conduct of the Vietnam War. He had some advice for Assange. He said that Assange "was 'not safe physically wherever he is'...At the height of the Pentagon Papers drama, the Nixon White House sent a CIA-sanctioned hit squad to 'permanently incapacitate' him." Reportedly, Pentagon operatives were also sent, to entrap Assange. {See Andrew Fowler's 2013 book, <u>The Most Dangerous</u> Man in the World – The Explosive True Story of Julian Assange and the Lies, Cover-ups, and Conspiracies He Exposed, p. xii-xiii}

THE MESSAGE—"Assange's WikiLeaks message was simple yet unsettling for his political opponents...The enigmatic [mysterious] Assange strongly believed in the US Constitution's First Amendment that enshrined freedom of speech. 'We are, if you like, enforcing the First Amendment around the world,' he said...a dangerous course. But then Assange has seldom shied away from danger." {DMW p. xiii}

Julian Assange made the same mistake that Manning did; they trusted the press. Assange trusted *The Guardian*. He trusted the *New York Times*. He trusted *Der Spiegel*. It would seem that he did not realize the level of corruption in the Press. {DMW p. 129-131, 136-137, 138-140}

MENDAX: "Just how Mendax broke into the Lonsdale Exchange is covered in the book, <u>Underground</u>, by Suelette Dreyfus and its co-author and researcher, Julian Assange, published in 1997. It required a lot of guile and intelligence, as well as a huge amount of nerve." {DWM p. 16}

MODUS OPERANDI: The M.O. or mode of operation employed by Julian Assange is exemplified in the way that he took on Scientology. "How Assange tackled Scientology provided an insight into his ability to transfer his mathematical logic to a political cause. He warned that 'the precedents the Church sets today' would become the 'weapons of corporate tyranny tomorrow'." The church of Scientology "had already won several court cases by what Assange called 'its manipulation of the legal system'. {DMW p. 26-27}

NO MORE WAR! ESPECIALLY NUCLEAR WAR: Assange disliked bullying and corruption. He targeted the US Air Force, Lockheed Martin, the US Navel Undersea

Warfare Engineering Station, TRW Redondo Beach and dozens of top-secret satellite communications organizations. "*But what seemed to drive the hackers* [speaking of The International Subversives, a small hacker group started by Assange in his early days] *most was the fear of nuclear war, and they wanted to get their message across.*" {DMW p. 18}

LOS ALAMOS NUCLEAR RESEARCH SITE—"Assange managed to make his way deep inside the computer system of the Los Alamos nuclear research site in the US state of New Mexico—one of the most highly secure places on earth—without being detected." Assange described his high-speed hack as "Trophy hunting".

"As they trawled through the most sensitive sites in the US, what amazed Assange was the discovery of 'a backdoor' to the US military national security coordination centre—an area that is supposed to keep US computer systems and installations secure...What Assange found most disturbing was that the 'US military had its own computer hackers' who were using the national coordination centre for 'target practice'. Assange believed hackers should be anarchists, not working for the military" {DMW p.19}

NASA—"What happened in October 1989 would be an act of anarchy that was hard to beat. It gave the US a fright and it thumped home hard an anti-nuclear message with a distinctly Australian flavour." NASA and the Kennedy Space Center in Florida were still smarting from the Challenger failure a few years earlier. NASA was launching the Galileo probe and did not want a repeat performance of the Challenger disaster. That day in October of 1989 "As hundreds of NASA staff across the United States turned up for work and turned on their computers, all was not well. Instead of the normal screen saver with the NASA logo, a rude sign popped up across their terminals: Your Computer Has Been Wanked...at the bottom of their screens they may have read: 'You talk of times of peace for all, and then prepare for war' followed by the word: *'oilz'.*" A Wank is a computer hack. Oilz referred to the anti-nuclear rock band Midnight Oil, whose nickname was "The Oilz". "The computers were telling their users...nearly hysterical—that all their confidential and top-secret files were being deleted...Ron Tencati, head of NASA cyber security, wrestled to deal with the flood of panicked staff. The Galileo probe was heading for a mission to Saturn, powered by a plutonium engine—not the first time that nuclear fuel had been used to give missions extra reach." According to Mr. Tencati, "We had a shuttle on the launch pad about to launch that had plutonium energy canisters for its power source. If this blew up like the Challenger did, all of this plutonium was going to kill everybody in Florida'. You didn't have to be a genius to work out what Worms Against Nuclear Killers meant...As the NASA staff returned to their desks they discovered none of their files had been

deleted...Tencati says he's not exaggerating when he describes the attack at the time as feeling like 'an electronic Pearl Harbour'". Even after feverish and unprecedented investigation, no one was ever charged with the Wank Worm. Assange has admitted that the Wank Worm was compliments of the Melbourne hacker group, The International Subversives, but that it is not known who wrote the program. {DMW p. 19-21}

PARENTS:

Julian's father: John Shipton. A supporter of his son's work later in his life.

Julian's stepfather: Brett Assange. Brett said of Julian, "*He always stood up for the underdog*". {DMW p. 4}

Julian's mother: Christine Assange. Christine Assange is described as a nonconformist, used to coping by herself. She has been described as strong willed. She was the daughter of Warren Hawkins, a college principal. As such, Christine's father would be highly suspect as being of the Catholic/Druid tendency, but certainly not of the Christian persuasion. In one act of defiance against her father, she burned her schoolbooks, a move clearly designed to have maximum impact against a college principal. In the early 1970's Christine bought a motorcycle and a tent with the profits that she had made from selling her paintings. "In Sydney, she joined a thriving counterculture community where she fell in love with a 'rebellious young man' she met at an anti-Vietnam War demonstration. His name was John Shipton...the relationship didn't last long...a few months...Shipton would re-enter Julian Assange's life much later as a supporter ... " Christine left the community, pregnant and single, and took a ferry to Magnetic Island, "where she'd managed to rent a cottage for \$12.00 a week at Picnic *Point, on the island's southern shore, just meters from the water*". {DMW p. 2}

PILGER, JOHN: Assange has many high-profile supporters, such as John Pilger. Pilger "offered £20 000 pounds (AUD\$31 600) bail..." at one of Assange's hearings. Pilger is a solicitor (lawyer) and a high-ranking academic. As an Australian journalist, Pilger wrote exposés of government wrongdoing. His exposés have become legend. Pilger told Judge Riddle that; "These charges against him [Assange] in Sweden are absurd and were judged absurd by a senior Swedish prosecutor. This was true, but another prosecutor had found that there was cause to answer—which was why Interpol had issued a warrant for his arrest. Julian Assange, the once obscure Australian computer hacker, had become—through design or default—the biggest cause célèbre of the decade". {DMW p. xi}

PRETTY GOOD PRIVACY: In June of 1996 there was an FBI investigation hearing into a system developed by Phil Zimmerman which could make available to the public the ability to have all text sent by email to be heavily encrypted. Zimmerman named his encryption system Pretty Good Privacy (PGP). Assange, like Edward Snowden, saw that the NSA was standing in the way of what he saw as everyone's, Right

to Privacy. Each stands as a freedom fighter for privacy. Both see that this weapon of control that the NSA possesses is being misused. It is being used, in their view and the view of those who the NSA stalks, to control and intimidate for the purpose of submission or elimination of those who do not fall in line for World Order. The NSA and the FBI "had a bad record with civil rights, and also targeting groups merely because they opposed government policies, spying on the anti-war movement...Zimmerman knew what it was like to have the FBI on your case...special agents had raided his home". The FBI finally dropped the prosecution, after they were sufficiently satisfied that they had done all that they could to make his life a living hell. "Just why the Justice Department didn't proceed with a case against Zimmerman isn't clear. It's possible the US First Amendment—enshrining freedom of speech—put the prosecutors on shaky ground...As he left the hearing, Zimmerman made one final observation: PGP was a force for democracy."

"Few had embraced Pretty Good Privacy more enthusiastically than Julian Assange, who used it to encrypt his emails. His stand against authoritarianism and what he saw as the unnecessary intrusion of the state grew more robust as the date for his court appearance and sentencing loomed closer." {DMW p. 29-31}

In June of 1966 Zimmerman attended a special Senate committee hearing investigating the use of encryption. "The FBI was investigating Zimmerman because he's developed a public version of a system that would allow all text sent by email to be heavily encrypted. It was doubtful even the biggest code-breakers in the world, just up the road from Washington at the National Security Agency (NSA), could read this kind of encrypted material...Pretty Good Privacy, or PGP. For the underground activists it was more than that—it was a fantastic tool to protect civil liberties against the state and corporations...for nearly a decade they'd been suspicious that the NSA...was standing in the way of what they saw as the right to privacy...for them, it was the issue of the state having too much power by collecting individual data and using the knowledge as a weapon to control and intimidate." {DMW p. 29}

The problem wasn't just the NSA. "The FBI had a bad record with civil rights, and also with targeting groups merely because they opposed government policies, spying on the anti-war movement...wire tapping..." "Few had embraced Pretty Good Privacy more enthusiastically than Julian Assange." {DMW p. 30-31}

The problem wasn't just the NSA and the FBI. It was also the CIA. "Wikileaks had acquired a secret list of attendees at the World Economic Forum shortly to be held in Davos, Switzerland...top of the hit list was George Soros [friend of the nefarious druid Maurice Strong]...suspected of secretly funding dissident groups who received money from the CIA." {DMW p. 60-61}

WikiLeaks was on Australia's "banned list of sites". "Assange has his biggest support base in Australia where opinion polls have said that two thirds of the people agree with the work he has done. What is more surprising is the degree of support he has received from news outlets in the country. In an unprecedented move, representatives from all the major media outlets in Australia with the exception of The Australian newspaper, signed a letter criticizing the Prime Minister for her actions: 'To aggressively attempt to shut WikiLeaks down, to threaten to prosecute those who publish official leaks, and to pressure companies to cease doing commercial business with WikiLeaks, is a serious threat to democracy, which relies on a free and fearless press,' it said. When the activist organization Getup.org launched a major campaign, thousands filled the streets in protest in Sydney and Melbourne. Public opinion rallied behind Assange...Assange told the crowd by video: 'It is interesting how some politicians single out my staff and myself for attack while saying nothing about the slaughter of thousands by the US military or other dictatorships. It is cowardly to bully a small media organisation, but that is what is happening here.' {DMW p. 128 and 216}

WikiLeaks was fighting an orgy of corruption. Assange was creating a system that could take on corruption in government and the military. "*Real journalism is simply the disclosure of whatever powerful vested interests want kept secret.*" {Andrew Fowler}

"The application of state power to silence and control the individual would be repeatedly resisted by Assange, as it had been from the beginning of his travels through the underground network of the Cypherpunks, to the birth of WikiLeaks. It was a journey that had driven him into the arms of anarchic liberalism." {DMW p. 67} The word liberalism as used here should be defined as a view that strongly supports individual rights and freedoms.

Julian Assange, described as an anarchist by the US State Department, would probably say that his objective was an 'end state'—the creation of a 'more just world'. {DMW p. 231}

SWEDEN: The Swedish government tried to *"eradicate him [Julian Assange] on the sex allegations"*. {DMW p. viii- ix}

"Though clearly eager to defend himself against the sexual allegations, they weren't Assange and his legal team's principal concern. He was more worried about possible extradition from Sweden to the United States, where the Obama administration was investigating the possibility of prosecuting him for espionage. In raising the likelihood that, charged with spying, Assange could face the death penalty in the United States, his lawyers were pushing his case to the limits." Previously, Assange had forced former British Prime Minister Tony Blair to defend the disclosure that WikiLeaks had made, that Blair's government had promised to protect US interests during an inquiry into the Iraq War. {DMW p. ix} Later, more information was leaked that showed that it was really the British government that was behind the Iraq War –the Royals wanted war – and that the United States covered this evil for Britain. Most people do not understand that the British government sees the United States as their puppet. It is the plan of the British that "the Colonies", as the US is referred to in Britain, should be taxed at a rate of 40% to keep the elite, super, super rich getting ever richer and us slaves in subjection. THE FAMILY or THE GREAT WHITE BROTHERHOOD: "In 1979, Christine [Julian Assange's mother] and Brett Assange separated. She moved to Lismore and met up with a musician, Keith Hamilton. They had a son, but by 1982 the relationship had broken down. Christine became involved in a ferocious custody battle and fled to her old haunt, Magnetic Island, with her two boys...the sanctuary didn't last for long...Julian says he remembers 'having to move very suddenly' to avoid detection by Hamilton. For the next five years, Christine and her two sons played a tormented game of hide and seek across Australia...just who Keith Hamilton was is still not clear. Julian says he understood during the days of their hiding that he [Hamilton] was the son of a notorious cult leader, Anne Hamilton-Byrne. Anne Hamilton-Byrne led a secretive sect that called itself The Family, or The Great White Brotherhood. At onetime she had twenty-eight children. Some of them were hers but most had been adopted, a number of them through false papers [human trafficking]. From what has been learned about the sect it would be safe to say that what it did was as close to evil as it's possible to be." {DMW p. 4-5}

The Family hid human trafficked children and controlled "hospitals". Anne Hamilton-Byrne helped to secure experimentation on "*Patients, often at their most vulnerable,* [who] were given experimental treatment as they struggled with their psychiatric illnesses. The treatment included heavy doses of LSD—a drug much favoured by Hamilton-Byrne". {DMW p. 7}

There was no joy for the children, "they were subjected to sadistic attacks. For wetting their beds they were beaten unmercifully with a collection of instruments—pieces of wood with nails and canes specially designed to cut the skin. Sometimes the children were hit in front of the others as a warning. In her book Unseen, Unheard, Unknown (the sect's motto) Sarah Hamilton-Byrne, taken from her mother at birth, says: 'We watched them trying to stifle their sobs, trying to be brave. And then, almost inevitably, we watched them break down, howling and screaming for mercy'. For failing to do a menial task, or for too much weight gain, they were starved; forced to 'miss' several meals at a time. A word out of place could mean being sent outside to sleep on the ground in sometimes freezing temperatures." {DMW p. 7-8}

"Yet, what the children feared most was something that many cultures celebrate puberty. They knew they would be subjected to horrific experiments. Locked in a dark room they were forced to take LSD while Hamilton-Byrne and psychiatrists or doctors who were members of the sect looked on. There they humiliated the children as they struggled to deal with the effects of the hallucinogenic drug, which Anne Hamilton-Byrne said would 'cleanse their spirit'." {DMW p. 8}

Thanks to Christine Assange, "The Assange family escaped the devastating impact of The Family". "During the period they hid, Assange said he was told Hamilton used several different identities. They were forced to change their hiding place, sometimes very suddenly. He says he believed The Family had a large network of people and they 'always managed to find out where we were'". {DMW p. 9-10}

THE MOST DANGEROUS MAN IN THE WORLD: Julian Assange, the once unknown Australian computer hacker, is known for the website he created called WikiLeaks. WikiLeaks attracted the attention of Daniel Ellsberg, one of the world's most famous whistleblowers. In the 1970's, Ellsberg's "dump" of classified materials, which became known as the Pentagon Papers, revealed the repeated lies of US administrations about their conduct in the Vietnam War and made him the first person to be accused of espionage for "revealing information to the American public". The Nixon administration also tried to prevent publication of The Pentagon Papers. Henry Kissinger called Ellsberg, The Most Dangerous Man in America. Ellsberg has dubbed Julian Assange as The Most Dangerous Man in the World. He said that Julian should "be quite proud of that" and said that Julian Assange is "not safe physically wherever he is". At the height of the Pentagon Papers drama "the Nixon White House sent a CIAsanctioned hit squad to 'permanently incapacitate' him. There were reports that the Pentagon had drawn together a group of operatives to track Assange down, using the vast array of America's intelligence-gathering and surveillance machinery in an attempt to trap him". {DMW p. xii-xiii} It is said that Henry Kissinger made the following statement to a Rockefeller at Maurice Strong's (d. Nov. 27, 2015) Baca Ranch just south of Crestone, Colorado: "We will rule the world from here".

Assange gave Britain's counterintelligence organization MI5 a real headache by upsetting Britain's oldest ally, the United States, and exposing deception in its prosecution of war. Assange laid bare the grim truth about the American invasion of Iraq. The torture of Iraqi prisoners and other war crimes were proven. The real number of civilian casualties, which had so carefully been withheld from the public by Washington, was also revealed. As Julian's stepfather, Brett Assange remembers, "*He always stood up for the underdog. He had a very good sense of equality and equity and was 'very angry about people ganging up on other people*". {DMW p. xi and 3-4} Julian Assange released 570,000 intercepts of pager messages sent on the day of the September 11th attacks and the visual bombshell of the "Collateral Murder" video— showing American soldiers firing on civilians and Reuters reporters. Julian Assange has achieved extremely great things. "It is like he is in a fantasy world...He fantasized in Melbourne about creating a system that could take on governments. And that, is what he has done". {DMW p 232}

An interesting note in history is, that a wild man from the Australian outback would cause the corporations and governments of the world to rethink their Orwellian ways; while the vandals broke down the gates of Rome.
